AB'SATTITUDEXPRESS (Trixton – Abbie'sgotattitude – American Winner)

The Stop The Jade Farm LLC homebred will be giving not only the owner-breeder its first Breeders Crown start but also trainer Lucas Wallin.

Starting her career late as a two-year-old, Ab'sattitudexpress raced only three times, winning two conditioned events. She came back as a sophomore to win a preliminary and the \$160,000 final of the New Jersey Sires Stakes then tried her hand in the Hambletonian Oaks, where she finished eighth.

Remaining in New Jersey, Ab'sattitudexpress won a preliminary and the \$56,000 final of the New Jersey Development Fund before shipping to The Red Mile. There, she became just the third horse on the year to beat Hambletonian champ Ramona Hill when pulling a 34-1 upset in a \$69,200 Bluegrass division. Finishing sixth in the \$255,000 Kentucky Filly Futurity, Ab'sattitudexpress went on to finish second in her Breeders Crown elimination.

A former assistant to trainer Ake Svanstedt, Wallin—a Sweden native—started his stable on a larger scale in 2017. He has since won nearly 100 races and earned over \$1.6 million in purses.

Driver Andrew McCarthy struck Breeders Crown glory in 2019, becoming the eighth driver in the history of the event to win four Breeders Crowns in the same year. He steered two of Alagna's three winners while also catching the drive on Dancin Lou (3YO Colt and Gelding Pace) and driving Caviart Ally (Mare Pace) to a win over eventual Horse of the Year Shartin N. A native of Australia, McCarthy came to the US in 2007 to race for trainer Noel Daley before expanding his presence to the tune of a US career worth \$51 million in purses with over 2,500 wins.

"She hasn't had any luck in the big ones with the posts," Lucas Wallin said. "It was very windy. When you cut the mile and go :58 to the half, you think you have a very good chance to win it. But Tetrick's horse raced good and came on the inside of us. But I was very happy with how Ab's raced and she never gave up. With an eighth of a mile left it looked like she would get beat by two lengths or so, but she tried her best. She hasn't disappointed me yet this year."

CAVIART EVA (Trixton – Caviart Elle – Windsong's Legacy)

By Hambletonian winner Trixton, Caviart Eva is the third starter for trainer Nancy Takter in this year's Three-Year-Old Filly Trot.

As a two-year-old, Caviart Eva managed only one win from nine starts—a 1:55.2 win in a Kentucky Sires Stakes (KYSS) preliminary. She finished second in two New Jersey Sires Stakes (NJSS) prelims to qualify for the \$200,000 final, but broke stride and finished fourth.

As a three-year-old she returned to the races in June, winning a conditioned trot before finishing third in a NJSS prelim. Following the NJSS, Caviart Eva scored victories in a \$42,700 Tompkins-Geers division and a \$30,000 Continentalvictory division. She competed in three KYSS preliminaries but missed the final, instead shipping to the Delaware County Fair where she won the \$41,100 Buckette. After a fifth-place finish in a \$69,200 Bluegrass division, Caviart Eva finished fourth in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Nancy Takter is having a career year with over 100 wins on the season and \$5.6 million in purses, placing her second for the year behind Ron Burke. She has won four Breeders Crown events including back-to-back victories in the Two-Year-Old Colt and Gelding Pace with Captain Crunch (2018) and Tall Dark Stranger (2019). She sent The Ice Dutchess in the 2019 Three-Year-Old Filly Trot to a third-place finish (behind Winndevie).

Nancy Takter also trains finalists Sorella and Spoiled Princess.

Driver Brett Miller has won three Breeders Crowns, winning his first in 2015 with Pure Country (2YO Filly Pace). He won his second in 2016 driving Racing Hill (3YO Colt Pace) and his third in 2017 with Split The House (Open Pace). In 2019, Miller relocated to his home state of Ohio after nearly a decade of travelling consistently on the Grand Circuit. For his career, Miller has won more than 8,700 races and \$93 million in purses.

Caviart Eva is a homebred for the Caviart Farms, which won its first Breeders Crown in 2018 with Captain Crunch (2YO Colt and Gelding Pace). It won its other two trophies in 2019 with Tall Dark Stranger (2YO Colt and Gelding Pace) and Caviart Ally (Mare Pace).

"I was happy with both of them [Caviart Eva and Sorella]," Takter said. "Eva is a game, honest filly. She's really an overachiever. She tries really hard. You can't help but like her. I was happy with Sorella too. She's not really as much of a sprinter as maybe Princess is. I think she raced good. She raced with shoes and she's better without shoes. She'll race without shoes in the final. She's been good all year. It's tough to maintain your form from May to November."

CRUCIAL (Father Patrick – Jolene Jolene – Muscle Hill)

After failing to make the Breeders Crown final last year, Crucial landed a spot in the final as she enters the twilight of her racing career.

Crucial won her first two starts, taking a Pennsylvania Sires Stakes (PASS) preliminary and an elimination of the Jim Doherty Memorial. She finished fourth in the final (to Hypnotic AM) and promptly shipped to Lexington for the Kentucky Sires Stakes (KYSS), where she won a prelim and finished third before finishing third in the \$250,000 final in her first start on Lasix. With third-place efforts in the \$215,000 Kentuckiana and a \$71,800 International Stallion Stake division, Crucial entered the Breeders Crown eliminations but just missed a berth into the final.

She returned as a sophomore at the start of June, finishing fourth in a conditioned trot. She later won a \$32,297 Currier & Ives division and followed with second-place efforts in a PASS prelim and a \$30,000 PA All-Stars division. After a fourth-place finish in the \$600,000 Hambletonian Oaks (to Sorella), she won another PASS prelim before winning the \$252,000 PASS Championship and following that with a third-place effort in the \$250,000 KYSS Final. Winning the \$105,000 Moni Maker at Hoosier Park, she has since only cashed a check when finishing fifth in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Ron Burke leads all active trainers in the Breeders Crown with over \$9 million earned in Breeders Crown events and 17 total trophies. He sits second on the all-time leaderboard to Jimmy Takter. Since taking over his father Mickey's stable in 2008, Burke has become the winningest trainer in the history of harness racing (winning his 11,000th race on Sept. 7 at The Meadows) and is the only trainer to record at least 1,000 wins in a single season. Burke's most recent Breeders Crown win came in 2019 with Warrawee Ubeaut (3YO Filly Pace). Burke has yet to send a winner in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot. His last starter in the event was Impinktoo, who finished ninth in the final.

Driver David Miller ranks second all-time in Breeders Crown earnings while having 24 trophies to his name. The Hall of Famer set the record for most Breeders Crown wins in a single year back in 2015 when he won five of the 12 events contested at Woodbine Mohawk Park. He ranks No. 2 among all drivers in harness racing history in purses, with \$247 million, and is No. 5 in wins. He has ranked among the top five in earnings 20 of the past 21 years and is again in the top five this season. He has driven two winners in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot: Susie's Magic (2006) and Broadway Donna (2016).

Bred by Steve Stewart, Maumee River Stables and Black Creek Farm, Crucial races for owners Burke Racing Stable LLC, W. J. Donovan, JandT Silva Purnel & Libb and Weaver Bruscemi LLC.

"Maybe I've over raced her," Burke said. "I'm trying to get her through the end of the year she's going to be bred next year. I knew I could go ahead and race her hard, and I did and I got a lot of money doing it. And now I'm maybe about paying the price for over racing her maybe. I'm trying to do different things with her. This week I think the weather will be better and I can take her shoes off; she's definitely a better horse when I can race her barefoot."

HYPNOTIC AM (Chapter Seven – Daydream AM S – Muscle Hill)

Favored in last year's Two-Year-Old Filly Trot, millionaire Hypnotic AM will try for Breeders Crown redemption in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot.

In 2019, Hypnotic AM went undefeated in her first seven starts, winning four New York Sires Stakes (NYSS) prelims, the elimination and \$310,700 Jim Doherty Memorial Final and the \$225,00) NYSS Final. She went on a month layoff and then shipped north for the Breeders Crown, finishing second in her elimination and third in the final. She returned as a sophomore in June winning an NYSS prelim and the \$207,250 Empire Breeders Classic Final. She finished second in the \$600,000 Hambletonian Oaks and \$160,140 Zweig Memorial but then won the \$225,000 NYSS Final followed by the \$250,000 Kentucky Sires Stakes Final. Before her Breeders Crown elimination she finished third in a \$70,200 Bluegrass division and second in the \$255,000 Kentucky Filly Futurity. Off the 9-5 favorite, she finished second in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Marcus Melander began his U.S. career in 2014 when his team moved from Stockholm to New Egypt, NJ onto a farm previously owned by Hall of Fame trainer/driver Stnaley Dancer. He won his first Breeders Crown in 2018 with Gimpanzee in the Two-Year-Old Colt Trot and scored his second with Gimpanzee in the Three-Year-Old Colt Trot.

Driver Brian Sears leads active drivers in Breeders Crown wins with 32 trophies, the second-most wins in the event behind John Campbell's 48. Last year Sears won two Breeders Crown events, driving Winndevie (3YO Filly Trot) and Bold Eagle (Open Trot) to victory. Sears holds the record for most wins in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot, driving six winners: Stroke Play (2003), Housethatruthbuilt (2004), Blur (2005), Broadway Schooner (2009), Bee A Magician (2013) and Winndevie (2019).

Hypnotic AM is a homebred for Courant Inc.

"I was very happy with her in the elimination," Melander said. "She got to the lead and just got beat by a neck. The draw was OK with the seven hole. She's always right there in these races, she always shows up. She's never missed the board in her entire life. You can always count on her. She's a great horse and definitely one of the fillies that can win the race."

LOVE A GOOD STORY (Chapter Seven – Celebrity Lovin – Andover Hall)

Winner of the \$255,000 Kentucky Filly Futurity, Love A Good Story will try to be just the eighth filly to also win a Breeders Crown Final. In recent years, Cedar Dove (2011), Shake It Cerry (2014), Wild Honey (2015) and Broadway Donna (2016) have managed to pull the double. Personal Banner (1996), Cameron Hall (2002) and Housethatruthbuilt (2004) are the others to have scored the double.

At two and three, Love A Good Story dominated the New York Sires Stakes (NYSS) circuit but failed to win the \$225,000 Finals. In total, she has won 10 NYSS prelims. Her two-year-old year ended with a win in an \$83,000 Bluegrass division and a second-place finish in a \$71,800 International Stallion Stake division. At three her lone wins up to the Kentucky Filly Futurity came in NYSS events—she finished second in the \$207,250 Empire Breeders Classic, seventh in the \$253,500 Del Miller Memorial and second in a \$70,200 Bluegrass division. She finished third in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Julie Miller has won one Breeders Crown when her husband, Andy Miller, drove Lucky Jim to victory in the 2009 Open Trot. She had two second-place finishes in 2018 with Top Flight Angel (Open Trot) and Met's Hall (3YO Colt Trot). In September, Miller won the inaugural Mohawk Million with Venerate. This year, Miller's stable ranks seventh in purses in North America with nearly \$3 million. She has finished among the Top 10 in five of the past six years. For her career, she has won nearly 2,000 races and \$45 million in purses.

Driver Andy Miller has won five Breeders Crown trophies, his first coming when driving Restive Hanover (2004 2YO Filly Pace) for his brother Erv Miller. Andy has yet to drive a winner in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot. For his career, Miller has won more than 9,600 races, ranking 20th in North American history, and earned more than \$130 million in purses, ranking 12th in history.

Bred by Celebrity Farms, Love A Good Story races for owners Pinske Stables, Kentuckiana Racing Stable and Daniel Plouffe.

"Andy decided to race her from off the pace," Julie Miller said. "It's been a good move her last few starts, and we did it again. I think she was really coming on for a goodclosing third. I wasn't tickled with the 10-hole, but that's better than the eight or nine. We'll see what happens with her. I think she's really peaking right now."

MAY BABY (Guccio – Free Wheeling – Credit Winner)

May Baby tries her hand again at the Breeders Crown, but this time on her home turf. When the Breeders Crown last came to Harrah's Hoosier Park in 2017, two Indiana Sires Stakes (INSS) champs parlayed their state-bred championship wins into Breeders Crown victories (Fiftydallarbill in the 3YO Colt Trot & Beckhams Z Tam in the 3YO Colt Pace).

Beginning her career unbeaten in four starts, May Baby sustained her first defeat in the fourth preliminary of the INSS. Winning the remaining two prelims, she went the 2-5 favorite in the \$270,000 Super Final but finished second to Rock Swan. Nonetheless she shipped north for the Breeders Crown, finishing fourth in her elimination and eighth in the final.

She returned to the races in late June and won her first three starts as a sophomore. She then dipped her toes into Grand Circuit company again for the Hambletonian Oaks, finishing 10th in the \$600,000 final. After finishing second in an INSS preliminary in her following start, May Baby took a few weeks off an uncorked four-consecutive wins culminating in a 1:52.2 victory in the \$270,000 INSS Super Final. She sped from off the pace with a :26.1 final quarter to snag the last berth in the Breeders Crown final.

Trainer-driver J. D. Yoder made his Breeders Crown debut last year with May Baby. He'll try for his first Breeders Crown victory in his second start while also trying to be the first trainer-driver to win in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot. Lifetime, James has won more than 270 races as a driver and 75 as a trainer. He surpassed \$1 million in career training purses earlier this month. He is among the top drivers and trainers at Harrah's Hoosier Park in win percentage this year.

His wife, owner Cheyenne Yoder, picked out May Baby at the 2018 Hoosier Classic Yearling Sale. It was the first time she selected a horse. The horse was born on Cheyenne's birthday, May 13. May Baby was bred by Oakwood Farms.

"For the Oaks she blew an abscess out," Yoder said. "It's been healing pretty good since then. [She] ended up winning the Super Final. She was a little on the right line the whole mile [in the elimination], which is unusual for her. So hopefully we can make a couple of changes for her this week and be better Saturday."

NEXT LEVEL STUFF (Sebastian K S – Nantab – Cantab Hall)

Once unable to race anywhere but on the front, Next Level Stuff has since developed a versatile temperament for trainer Jim Campbell.

Making breaks in every start where she didn't race on the lead as a two-year-old, Next Level Stuff managed victories in a prelim and the \$40,000 final of The Stallion Series, a \$43,150 Keystone Classic division, a \$65,100 John Simpson Memorial division, a \$30,000 Liberty Bell division and the \$147,600 Matron Final. She came back as a three-year-old to win her first three starts—two in conditioned events and one in a Pennsylvania Sires Stakes (PASS) preliminary.

Following a second-place finish in a \$42,700 Tompkins-Geers division, Next Level Stuff competed in the \$600,000 Hambletonian Oaks where she finished fifth. She finished second in another two PASS preliminaries and then finished fourth in the \$252,000 championship before winning her next two starts in a \$30,000 Liberty Bell division and a \$70,200 Bluegrass division. Prior to the Breeders Crown elimination, she sat a pylon trip to finish fourth in the \$255,000 Kentucky Filly Futurity. She again rode the pylons in her Breeders Crown elimination, but fired to the finish in :26.1 to win in 1:53.4.

Trainer Jim Campbell has four Breeders Crown wins on his resume. He last won a Breeders Crown in this event when Broadway Donna won in 2016. He also trained 2009 winner Broadway Schooner—the dam of Broadway Donna—and scored his first Breeders Crown win in 1998 with Galleria in the Three-Year-Old Filly Pace. In 2019, Campbell's stable earned \$3.13 million in purses despite making only 265 starts. Going back nearly 30 years, only three other trainers (Gene Riegle in 1992, Jimmy Takter in 2000 and Greg Peck in 2009) made fewer than 300 starts in a year and earned more than \$3 million in purses. Campbell is the only one in the group to accomplish the feat without a horse in his stable reaching \$1 million. For his career, Campbell has won more than 1,300 races and \$47 million in purses.

Driver Tim Tetrick has won 20 trophies in Breeders Crown events and sits fourth among active drivers in event earnings and seventh all time. His most recent Breeders Crown victories came in 2018 with Shartin N (Mare Pace) and Lily Stride (3YO Filly Trot). Tetrick sits third all-time in career earnings with \$225 million in purses and eighth all time in wins with more than 11,700. Tetrick has two total wins in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot, his other coming with Kadealia (2008).

Next Level Stuff is a homebred for Runthetable Stables.

"I couldn't be happier with her, the way she's been going," Jim Campbell said. "She's been very consistent all year long. She had a real good race the other night and hopefully we can keep her going for the final. She was really good in the Kentucky (Filly) Futurity final, she just had some bad racing luck. She was pinned in and didn't get out until late. But she raced really good there and she took advantage of a good trip Friday at Hoosier."

ROCK SWAN (Swan For All – Jolly Jessica – Keep It A Secret)

Much like her Indiana Sires Stakes (INSS) rival May Baby, Rock Swan will try to benefit from the Breeders Crown visiting her home turf. When the Breeders Crown last came to Harrah's Hoosier Park in 2017, two INSS champs parlayed their state-bred championship wins into Breeders Crown victories (Fiftydallarbill in the 3YO Colt Trot & Beckhams Z Tam in the 3YO Colt Pace).

Last year, Rock Swan upended May Baby in the \$270,000 INSS Super Final following five preliminary victories and a second-place finish in the \$215,000 Kentuckiana. She capped her year with an open-length victory in the \$77,000 Madison at Harrah's Hoosier Park. To start her three-year-old season, Rock Swan finished runner-up to May Baby in the \$33,000 Star Destroyer and in the first INSS preliminary. She added Lasix in her third start of the year and won five-straight races, four coming in INSS prelims and one in a \$29,632 Horseman Stake at the Indiana State Fair. After a third-place finish in the \$105,000 Moni Maker, Rock Swan settled for second in the \$270,000 INSS Super Final. She finished fourth in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Erv Miller has won five Breeders Crown trophies, his first in 2004 with Restive Hanover—driven by brother Andy Miller—in the Two-Year-Old Filly Pace. His most recent win came in that event when his son Marcus Miller drove Someomensomewhere to victory in 2016, making him the only trainer in history to win a Breeders Crown with a brother and a son. Miller also won with Lis Mara (2006 Open Pace) and Shark Gesture (2006 Three-Year-Old Colt Pace). For his career, Miller has won more than 5,600 races, a total that ranks No. 4 in history. He has finished among North America's Top 10 trainers in wins 15 times in the past 18 years.

Harrah's Hoosier Park's leading driver Trace Tetrick will drive Bayfield Beach as the Illinois native and brother to Tim Tetrick tries for his fourth Breeders Crown trophy. He made his Breeders Crown debut in 2014 with Color's A Virgin (2014 3YO Filly Pace) and finished fourth in the final. He won his first Breeders Crown in 2015 with supplemental entry Freaky Feet Pete and won two when the event last came to Harrah's Hoosier Park, steering Fiftydallarbill (2017 3YO Colt and Gelding Trot) and Blazin Britches (2017 3YO Filly Pace) to victory.

Bred by Bobby Brower and Debra Garland, Rock Swan races for owners S And R Racing Stables and Anthony Lombardi.

"She's there every week, does her work well and been one tough race mare," Erv Miller said. "She's got weeks when she's better than other weeks, she's got front feet that bother her a little bit. But most of the time, she's pretty much right on; right there racing good. She's probably exceeded our expectations early on, tough racing when you got someone like May Baby in there too. She had a really good night in the elimination and hopefully we repeat—we didn't have much luck in the draw. We've been working on her front feet, everything else is pretty much status quo."

SORELLA (Muscle Hill – Kadealia – Kadabra)

Sired by two-time Breeders Crown winner Muscle Hill (2008 2YO Colt Trot, 2009 3YO Colt Trot) out of Breeders Crown winner Kadealia (2008 3YO Filly Trot), who is sired by Breeders Crown winner Kadabra (2002 3YO Colt Trot), Sorella will try to join her bloodline as a Breeders Crown winner.

Trained by Staffan Lind in her two-year-old year, Sorella won two races from nine starts, her lone wins coming in a Pennsylvania Sires Stakes (PASS) preliminary and a \$20,000 Arden Downs division. She finished second in the \$252,000 PASS Championship and fourth in the \$215,000 Kentuckiana but wrapped her year following a fifth-place finish in a Kindergarten Classic prelim in mid-October.

With Lind moving back to his home country of Sweden, Nancy Takter acquired Sorella and promptly spun her in a strong direction. She won her first three starts of her sophomore year—including the \$61,000 Reynolds Memorial—before finishing fourth in the \$253,500 Del Miller Memorial. She then won the \$600,000 Hambletonian Oaks going wire to wire and will try to become the 11th filly to win both the Oaks and the Breeders Crown in the same year (the last filly to do it was Ariana G in 2017). Other wins on her resume include a \$81,405 Casual Breeze division and \$70,200 Bluegrass division. She finished third in the \$350,000 Elegantimage Final and \$255,000 Kentucky Filly Futurity prior to her third-place effort in her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Nancy Takter is having a career year with over 100 wins on the season and \$5.6 million in purses, placing her second for the year behind Ron Burke. She has won four Breeders Crown events including back-to-back victories in the Two-Year-Old Colt and Gelding Pace with Captain Crunch (2018) and Tall Dark Stranger (2019). Nancy Takter also trains finalists Spoiled Princess and Caviart Eva.

Driver Yannick Gingras ranks sixth all-time, third active, on the Breeders Crown leaderboard with over \$10 million earned and 23 trophies won. Gingras won his first Breeders Crown in 2007 driving 50-1 shot Southwind Serena to an upset in the Three-Year-Old Filly Trot. He has since won this event two more times, driving Maven (2012) and Ariana G (2017) to victories.

Sorella was bred and is co-owned by Elmer Fannin (who won his only Breeders Crown trophy with Kadealia), Crawford Farms Racing and Brent Fannin.

Kadealia remains the longest priced Breeders Crown winner.

"I was happy with both of them [Caviart Eva and Sorella]," Takter said. "Eva is a game, honest filly. She's really an overachiever. She tries really hard. You can't help but like her. I was happy with Sorella too. She's not really as much of a sprinter as maybe Princess is. I think she raced good. She raced with shoes and she's better without shoes. She'll race without shoes in the final. She's been good all year. It's tough to maintain your form from May to November."

SPOILED PRINCESS (Trixton – Fashion Spooner – Broadway Hall)

Racing most of her career for trainer Richard "Nifty" Norman, Spoiled Princess only a month ago was acquired via online auction by owners Black Horse Racing and Christina Takte for a reported \$90,000.

As a two-year-old, she won three races, including a \$25,000 New Jersey Sires Stakes prelim and a \$97,298 Champlain division. She competed in eliminations for the Jim Doherty Memorial and Peaceful Way, but failed to make either final. Her year ended with a seventh-place finish in an \$83,000 Bluegrass division.

She returned at three with a fifth-place finish in a conditioned event before winning a \$25,000 New Jersey Sires Stakes prelim. She qualified for the \$160,000 final, but broke stride into the first turn and finished ninth. With a third-place finish in a \$42,700 Tompkins-Geers division, Spoiled Princess skipped the Hamlbetonian Oaks and finished eighth in a \$30,000 Continentalvictory division. After going on rest for a month, Spoiled Princess returned to win a conditioned event and from there won the \$41,100 Buckette at the Delaware County Fair—her last start for "Nifty" Norman. Once in Nancy Takter's barn, she added Lasix and Spoiled Princess finished second in a \$70,200 Bluegrass division and won a \$10,000 overnight at The Red Mile before winning her Breeders Crown elimination.

Trainer Nancy Takter is having a career year with over 100 wins on the season and \$5.6 million in purses, placing her second for the year behind Ron Burke. She has won four Breeders Crown events including back-to-back victories in the Two-Year-Old Colt and Gelding Pace with Captain Crunch (2018) and Tall Dark Stranger (2019). She sent The Ice Dutchess in the 2019 Three-Year-Old Filly Trot to a third-place finish (behind Winndevie).

Driver Dexter Dunn is in his second full season driving in North America. He made his Breeders Crown debut in 2019 while winning two titles, driving Amigo Volo (2YO Colt and Gelding Trot) and Manchego (Mare Trot). The 2015 World Driving Champion currently sits No. 1 in earnings for the year following a campaign which earned him the USHWA Driver of the Year Award in 2019.

Spoiled Princess was bred by Robert Mc Nerney and Hauser Bros. Racing Enterprise LLC.

"She was in really good shape when she got to me; she was sound and a wellmannered filly," Nancy Takter said. "She's beautifully gaited. We just made some bridle changes and stuff like that, and I put her on Lasix. She's maybe a little fresher than some of the other ones now. That plays to her advantage as well. My Dad [Jimmy Takter] called me and asked about her. He was really looking for a mare that he could breed to Ready For Moni later, that would cross well with Ready For Moni. She looked good, a nice-gaited filly, a nice big strong-looking filly. I knew she was sound. I didn't see where you could go wrong with buying her."
